SACRAMENTS

Baptism

Baptism is celebrated after consultation with the parish staff as to date. Registered membership in the parish and attendance at a Baptism Class are required for all parents prior to their first child's Baptism.

Holy Communion

A two-year required sacramental preparation process begins in the first grade. It culminates in the celebration of First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion in the second grade.

Confirmation

A two-year required sacramental preparation process begins in the sixth/seventh grade. It culminates in the celebration of Confirmation.

Matrimony

A six-month required sacramental preparation process begins when the engaged couple meets with the priest or deacon and culminates in the couple's exchange of consent on their wedding day.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

A one-year process for preparation and study is required for all those interested in becoming Catholic.

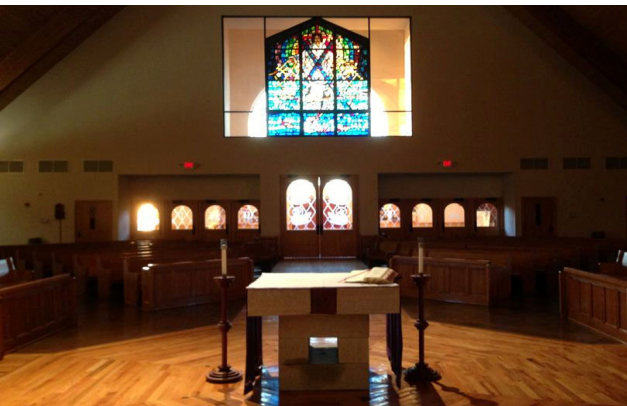
CHAPTER THREE: WORSHIP SPACE

Think Eucharistic Sacrifice, the covenant meal Jesus revealed at the Last Supper. (I Cor 11)



The main interior of a church is called the worship space. Passing through these Gospel Doors you step onto wood flooring in the shape of a cross. It speaks of the cross all followers of Jesus must take up daily. It is the pattern of Christian life. The Cross is our only boast. Our worship here is the offering of how we have lived our faith, carried our cross to witness to Jesus, everyday (Lk 9:23). Baptism empowers us to make our offering in communion with the offering of Jesus on the Cross (I Cor 11:24 ff). Yes, being a disciple requires daily self-sacrifice in the footsteps of Jesus. At the heart of the cross stands the altar (as built by the Renner Brothers and Bill Fister). As you look around the Church, you will notice the net theme is everywhere, even in the expansion joint design in the floor. Once you pass through the Gospel doors, you are in the net. You are chosen to be part of the harvest and to be a worker in the harvest, won by the mystery of the Cross of Jesus to glorify the Heavenly Father (Jn 15:8).

The Altar: The most important symbol in the church building.



At the altar we believe we encounter the saving action of Christ on the Cross of Calvary.

This altar was designed to combine the twelve stone altars of the Old Law and the altar Jesus used to save us. It was recognized in a national art contest by Music and Liturgy Magazine as a runner up in the permanent installation category.

If you are accustomed to being in a church you will immediately notice something very different about the sanctuary at St. Andrew's. There is no raised platform. There are three reasons for this intentional choice. The two theological reasons are rooted in the Incarnation of God the Son. He "emptied

himself” thereby coming all the way down to our level. The second theological reason is the community is meant to participate fully in the liturgy, not by watching but by personal involvement. The third reason is both charitable and practical. The decision not to elevate the altar makes it readily accessible to those for steps and ramps prove a challenge. All are to have access to the Banquet Table, the Altar, of the Lamb.

At the altar Catholics believe they are swept up into the saving mystery of Jesus on the Cross and they become a gift for God, Our Father, in Christ. This is the meaning of our response to the adoption our Heavenly Father has accomplished in this through Christ by the action of the Holy Spirit. It is not lip service but our self-dedication to the glory of God in union with Jesus. At the altar, the adopted Children of God, as a Nation of Priests lead by an ordained priest (made to act in the name of Jesus by ordination), offer God the perfect adoration Jesus offers in heaven, namely the offering of his life blood on the Cross. The purpose of Jesus’ offering and the Christian discipleship in union with him is summarized in the Doxology the special climax, the central prayer, the Eucharistic Prayer, **“Through him, with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all glory and honor are yours Almighty Father, forever and ever. Amen.”** This Amen is our renewed commitment to Jesus and to participate in his mission. Jesus glorifies his Heavenly Father by restoring us to him. His ministry of reconciliation is the mission of the Church. This is our universal mission statement. We are commissioned to attract and invite everyone to glorify God by being reconciled to God through Jesus and living in the unity of the Holy Spirit.

Finally, **to seal our participation in this sacrifice of praise and to live by it in a daily life of service, we are nourished with the Body and Blood of the Risen Lord. Jesus is made truly present at the consecration in what was once mere bread and wine.** St. Augustine taught that we become what we consume, the
